The Administrator Survey gathered input from school administrators on elements of Rhode Island's Basic Education Program (BEP), including:

- Teaching and Student Achievement;
- Families and Communities;
- Safe and Supportive Schools; and
- Funding and Resources.

This report is organized by each of these categories. The findings are intended to be used to inform decisions at all levels-including the classroom, school, district, and state.

The survey data are reported in tables showing the total number and percentage of administrators answering each item for this LEA and across the state. The survey allowed individuals to skip any question that did not apply to them or that they did not wish to answer. Therefore, the number of responses to any one question may vary. In order to protect individuals' rights to confidentiality, items with fewer than ten responses are not reported. In these cases, a dash (-) indicates that there are insufficient responses to report.
